First Sunday in Advent

What is Advent?

Advent is the first season of the church year. The word comes from the Latin "adventus" or "coming." During the season of Advent, Christians enter a time of anticipation, preparation and hope. Advent lasts for four Sundays, ending in the celebration of Christmas.

Personal reflections on Advent:

- 1. Advent can be seen as a season of waiting. What are we waiting for or anticipating during this month? Does the waiting of Advent feel like other kinds of waiting you have done?
- 2. How else would you describe the season of Advent? What are your strongest memories about the Advent experience?
- 3. On this first Sunday, we read from Isaiah 2: 1 5. Does this reading feel like Advent to you? Why or why not?

Isaiah 2: 1 - 5

2 This is what Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:

the mountain of the LORD's temple will be established as the highest of the mountains; it will be exalted above the hills, and all nations will stream to it.
